The following programs generally involve one or more weeks of intensive practical field experiences, follow-up lab work and discussions, and are taught by leading national and regional authorities. Program participants include well-qualified graduate and undergraduate university and college students who enjoy attending programs with professional field biologists and consultants, university professors, foresters, teachers, serious amateur naturalists, as well as personnel from museums, botanical gardens, various federal and state agencies, and numerous environmental organizations. Most programs are offered at the Humboldt Field Research Institute (formerly known as Eagle Hill Research Station), which is located on the coast of Maine on the summit of the peninsula just east of the Schoodic Pt. section of Acadia National Park and just west of Petit Manan National Wildlife Refuge. Most, but not all, programs may be taken for 1 to 2 or more graduate or undergraduate credits from The University of Maine (please inquire). IMMUNIZATION

Maine State Law (220 MRSA §6359) requires all students born after 1956 enrolled in a degree program or registered full-time to furnish proof of the following immunizations:

1. Diphtheria and Tetanus (DT) within the last 10 years. (If a tetanus only was given, it must have been administered within the last 5 years.)
2. Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) after the first birthday. Live vaccine must have been used. If immunized prior to 1973, a re-vaccination is recommended. Your immunization record must be a photocopy of the original medical record including the date and type of immunization, and the signature of the individual providing the Immunization. Send this record to Immunization Office, 5721 Cutler Health Center, Orono, ME, 04469-5721 or FAX to 207-581-3997.

Immunization records are stored in electronic format and may be released with a verbal request to the student or another medical or educational institution as a summary statement. For questions or special options, please call 207-581-4005.

GUARANTEED VS. CONTINGENCY-BASED COURSES

While most courses offered in the Summer Session are guaranteed, there are many courses (including all courses in Session 1 and Session 2) which are offered on a contingency basis (i.e., a minimum of 12 students for an undergraduate course and 6 students for a graduate course is required in order for the course to be taught). Each course offered on a contingency basis is so noted on our website.

Italian Renaissance Art and Architecture—
This class will explore how painting, sculpture and architecture articulated the breadth of ideas that flourished in and around Florence, Rome, and Venice from the fourteenth through the sixteenth centuries.
