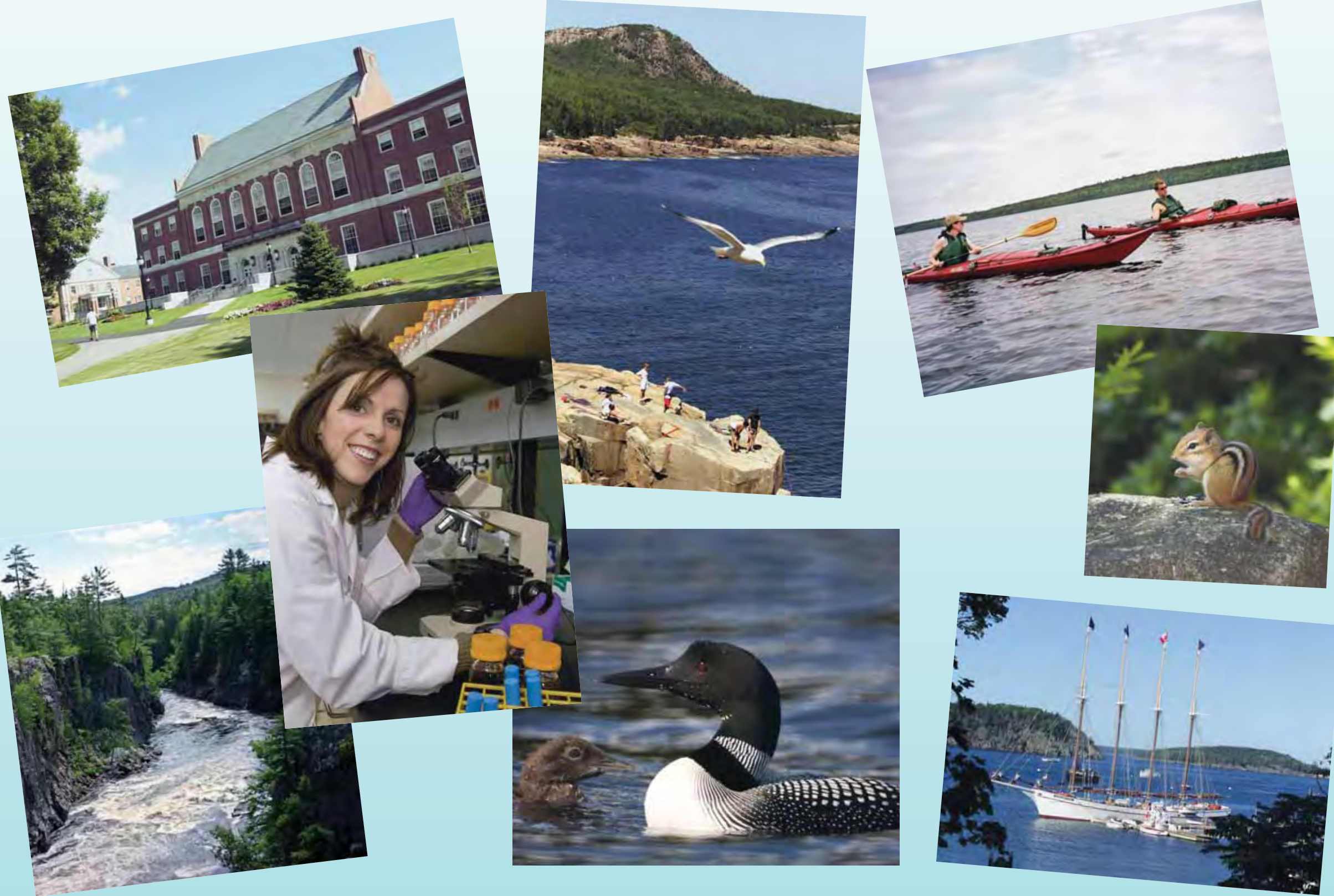

Eagle Hill Field Seminars, 2006



Seminars specializing in all aspects of the natural history sciences, including seminars on watershed issues, classical ecology, biology and taxonomy, ecological restoration, and scientific illustration

In support of field biologists, modern field naturalists, and students of the natural history sciences, Eagle Hill offers specialty seminars and workshops at different ecological scales for those who are interested in understanding, addressing, and solving complex ecological questions. Eagle Hill has long been recognized as offering hard-to-find seminars and workshops which provide important opportunities for training and meeting others who are likewise dedicated to the natural history sciences.

Eagle Hill field seminars are of special interest because they focus on the classical natural history of one of North America's most spectacular and pristine natural areas, the coast of eastern Maine from Acadia National Park to Petit Manan National Wildlife Refuge and beyond. Most seminars combine field studies with follow-up lab studies and a review of the literature. Additional information is provided in lectures, slide presentations, and discussions. Seminars are primarily taught for people who already have a reasonable background in a seminar program or in related subjects, or who are keenly interested in learning about a new subject. Prior discussions of personal study objectives are welcome. Credits and CEUs are available through the University of Maine, Orono, ME.

Statewide MAT in French: Summer of 2006



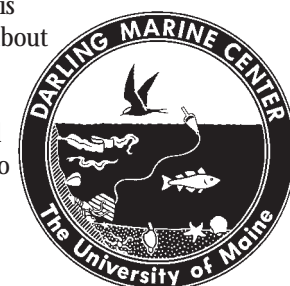
Plans are being developed to make the Master of Arts in Teaching French readily available to teachers statewide. The focus of the program is a summer institute that assembles a community of learners in an immersion setting and that maximizes the participation of faculty from throughout the University of Maine System and from the State's private colleges. The summer of 2006 will feature courses on the teaching of modern languages, teaching of literature K-12, a Québec institute, and courses on French culture and grammar. Candidates will have the option of completing their program in two summers of 12 credits each and an academic year (1 course per semester) or spreading their course load over several years by taking advantage of courses offered in future summer institutes and online or at campuses in their region. The Darling Marine Center

Maine State Law (220 MRSA 60359) requires all students born after 1956 enrolled in a degree program or registered full-time to furnish proof of the following immunizations:

1. Diphtheria and Tetanus (DT) within the last 10 years. (If a tetanus only was given, it must have been administered within the last 5 years.)
2. Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) after the first birthday. Live vaccine must have been used. If immunized prior to 1973, a revaccination is recommended. Your immunization record must be a photocopy of the original medical record including the date and type of immunization, and the signature of the individual providing the immunization. Send this record to Immunization Office, 5721 Cadler Health Center, Orono, ME, 04469-5721 or FAX to 207-581-3997. Immunization records are stored in electronic format and may be released with a verbal request to the student or another medical or educational institution as a summary statement. For questions or special options, please call 207-581-4005.
